



# HISTORY OF BIF

will like to start by expressing my gratitude to God for making this day a reality as we gather together to celebrate our 21st anniversary as an organization. Glory be to God Almighty for helping the BIF meet and surpass, the odds notwithstanding, the goals we set for ourselves at the inception of this organization. On the 4th of july 2003, I convened a meeting of some very energetic and patriotic Bonny indigenes at the residence of Mr. Nengi Halliday in North Brunswick, New Jersey. The gathering was to fashion out solutions to the numerous problems that beset us as a people both at home and abroad. I chose that location for logistic and strategic reasons. Those present at that meeting were Nengi Halliday, Leslie Green, Dima Brown, Late Ted Allison, Maxwell Brown, Atedo Banigo, Gogo Brown, Chris Jumbo, Steve Benstowe, Norman Halliday and Adango Miadonye. At the end of the meeting, we resolved to form an umbrella organization for Bonny people in North America.

We had simple dreams. We resolved to live by choice and not by chance, to make changes and not excuses, to be useful and not be used. We were courageous enough not to follow where ever the path may lead, but instead to go where no path exists and leave a trail. We were on the right track as evidenced by our accomplishments.

The BIF was formed to be a catalyst for change, to promote education, Ibani culture and heritage, to foster unity and progress among Bonny people. I feel excited to say that BIF has lived up to its billing. With the wind on our back and God with us, we have achieved a few notable things which are, but not limited to:

- Formation of the BIF on 4th July 2003 and its registration on 4th of February 2004, as the first and only registered Bonny organization in North America.
- Organization of annual conventions, at which we form new friendships and cement old bonds.
- Medical outreach to Bonny, during which lectures on topics of public health importance were delivered. A health clinic with distribution of free medical supplies to the indigent.
- 4.Donation of an ECG (Electrocardiogram) machine to the Bonny General Hospital for the diagnosis of Cardiac conditions.

5.Donation and distribution of protective face masks to all the Major Houses in Bonny, during the COVID -19 Pandemic.

- Update of our Lord's Prayer in Ibani to encourage usage of Ibani language.
- Formation of the first Bonny cultural groups (Owu ogbo and Eremina Ogbo) in North America.
- Advocacy and campaigns towards the completion of the Bonny-Bodo Road.
- Advocacy and campaigns towards the rebuilding of the Bonny landing jetty in Port Harcourt.
- Award of Bursary/Scholarships to deserving Bonny students.
- 11.Recognition and presentation of lifetime achievement awards to notable Bonny citizens in the fields of History, Medicine, Law, Community advocacy, etc.
- 12.Launching of the Bonny Light House, an interactive internet forum for Bonny indigenes at home and abroad.
- Interfacing with the Rivers State Government on issues of importance to Ibani people.
- 14. The erection of a new 17-foot-tall monument over the old one of Nigeria's first professional photographer, Late Jonathan Adagogo Green at the Bonny Cemetery.
- 15. The distribution of food packages (rice, geisha, and other condiments) to over 400 widows and the elderly, in the Bonny community, through BIF's outreach program.
- It is evident from the forgoing that the BIF has and continues to play its role as the foremost community-based organization among the Ibani at home and abroad. The BIF in the years ahead, God willing, will continue to strive for the development and advancement of our homeland Bonny.

# Re: 2024 Bonny Island Foundation (BIF) Annual Convention: BIF at 21 Years: CONGRATULATORY MESSAGE

I write to congratulate the entire members of the Executive Council, Board of Trustees and general membership of the Bonny Island Foundation (BIF) USA and Canada, on the occasion of the 21st Anniversary of the Foundation, with the theme, 'BIF at 21: Our Home Coming. Celebrating Jonathan Adagogo Green, and Community Outreach', which is scheduled to take place at the Dolphin Hotels and Industrial Park, Grand Bonny, Grand Bonny Kingdom, Rivers State, Nigeria, December 20 – 23, 2024.

Obviously, the theme of this year's BIF Annual Convention is apt. Firstly, it is exciting that BIF members are all travelling home from the USA and Canada, to Ancient Grand Bonny Kingdom, to have your 21st Anniversary Celebrations. By so doing, in particular, young BIF members in diaspora, would have the opportunity to better know, understand, experience and appreciate their traditional homeland (Ancient Grand Bonny Island Kingdom), along with its very rich cultural heritage and people, as well as the ongoing state of affairs, among other things, in the Kingdom, which is strategically located in the Eastern part of the oil-rich Ancient Niger Delta region.

Ancient Grand Bonny Island Kingdom was founded by its Founding Ancestors and God-given (Natural) Traditional Owners (Ibanise KoromaTaduapu cum Ibanise YanaTaduapu), led by its Foremost Founding Patriarchs and Premier Monarchs (Tari Amanyanapu) Alagbariye, Opuamakuba and Asimini as well as Ndoli-Okpara, all of whom were Blood-descendants of







their Blood Ancestor, Ebeni, after whom they named the Kingdom (Ibanise). Ebeni hailed from the Isedani 'Aseme' (Royal) Lineage of Okoloba in Kolokuma (also called Kolokuma Okoloba or Kolokuma Okoloama), in Kolokuma-Opokuma LGA of Bayelsa State, Central Niger Delta. The Kingdom was founded before about 1000 AD. Consequently, during the primaeval, primordial or aboriginal era of the Kingdom, which covered from before 1000 AD to before 1740 AD, through the reign of thirteen Monarchs (Amanyanapu), the Kingdom became a classic primordial African sovereign state and civilization, as well as a great pride of Ancient Ijaw nation, the entire Primaeval Nigerian Delta region and beyond. From when Bonny Kingdom was founded (before 1000 AD) to present-day, the Kingdom, equipped from onset, with its Welfarist House System of governance, in the frameworks of its identified Three Landmark periods of history. Four Generations of 'Okoloama Ingie KiriFajie' (which means 'Bonny Kingdom, as comprised, constituted or made-up of its Ibanise. Fourteen Units/Wards/Sections/Lineages/Families/Houses), and the reign of Twenty Three Monarchs (Amanyanapu), has existed for more than Ten Centuries and Twenty Four Years.

It is commendable that BIF has thought it wise to celebrate Jonathan Adagogo Green, Nigeria's renowned first professional photographer, who is noted for his meticulous photo documentation of the culture and traditions of Ibani people and more, including the affairs of British colonial government in the country. I particularly commend the monument BIF has almost completed, in order to immortalize our country's Premier professional photographer of Ibani stock of Ancient Ijaw ethnic nationality.

Concerning Community Outreach programmes and projects, BIF is one of the outstanding Community-based Organizations of our Ancient Kingdom and Bonny LGA. I therefore greatly applied the numerous, consistent and continuing Community Outreach programmes and projects of BIF, towards the wellbeing of our people and sustainable community empowerment and development in our Ancient Kingdom.



We rejoice with you on this feat and thank you for your tremendous service to our homeland so far, we pray for God's continued guidance, wisdom, and strength, as you discharge your duties to your (our) constituency.

It is also noteworthy to recognize and congratulate The Honourable Speaker of the Rivers State House of Assembly (RSHA), Rt. Hon. Victor Oko-Jumbo on your history-making ascension to the speakership of the RSHA. We are gladdened by your elevation as the first Speaker of Bonny extraction and wish you a very successful tenure.

As an organization, with God guiding us, we have matured, and have achieved a lot; despite some challenges, we have come out stronger, and more determined in our quest to positively impact on our kingdom, and humanity at large.







Our homecoming to Grand Bonny as a team, was by God's divine grace, and I want to specially thank, and appreciate all BIF members, and friends of BIF some of whom embarked on long journeys to celebrate with us, as well as those who could not be with us today, but have helped in no small measures to make today a reality. Our homecoming is also an opportunity to reunite with our brothers and sisters at home, and to collaborate with you, on how we can create synergies in our quest to advance our people, and Grand Bonny kingdom.

We acknowledge the importance of language as an integral part of one's identity, while also recognizing the threat of our fading language. To this end, and as one of the key goals of this administration, BIF has concluded plans for the deployment of Ibani Language Lecture Series to our Ibani sons and daughters in Diaspora. Our goal is to ensure that all sons and daughters in Diaspora who avail themselves of the opportunity to learn Ibani language can do so, and be fluent in speaking and in writing, in no distant time.

Today is also remarkable as we celebrate the life, and works of a Nigerian icon of Bonny extraction, Jonathan Adagogo, Green, Nigeria's first professional photographer. So much has been written about him, yet many have not heard of this great man.

I will try to summarize some of the lessons learned from his life and works as follows: Jonathan Adagogo Green was a trailblazer, by pioneering photographic artistry; he did not go where the path may lead, instead, he created a path and left a trail.

He lived an ordinary life but did extraordinary things. He took his professional calling seriously, and exemplified Martin Luther King Jr.'s quote "No work is insignificant. All labor that uplifts humanity, has dignity and importance, and should be undertaken with painstaking excellence".

He had an impactful career and died at the young age of 32 years (1873-1905). Though he lived a relatively short life, as Dr. Edwards J. Stieglitz posited, 'it is not the years in your life that counts; it is the life in your years". Pericles also quoted "The great use of life is to spend it for something that will outlast it" Chuck Palahniuk, in corroborating Pericles's position said "We all will eventually die; the goal is not to live physically forever; the goal is to create something that will".

incredible force of will and unwavering determination, he raised a substantial amount of money for it through BIF, and executed this project successfully, with the immense support of Dr Leslie Green, Wari-Alabo-elect Sotonye Banigo, and Amaopusenibo Dennis (Bob) Ezekiel-Hart. On behalf of BIF also, I want to extend our special thanks to all others who contributed in no small way towards Jonathan Adagogo Green's successful monument project execution. May God richly bless you, and replenish your purses, Amen.

Outreach to our community is a way BIF gives back in support of our brothers, sisters, and community.

#### Some notable community outreach programs we have carried out over the years include:

- Medical outreach; a health clinic with the distribution of free medical supplies to the needy.
- Donation of an ECG machine to the Bonny General Hospital for the diagnosis of cardiacconditions.
- Donation, and distribution of protective face masks to all major houses in Bonny, during COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.
- The award of over 70 scholarships for tertiary institutions to Bonny indigenes across the 34 houses of Grand Bonny Kingdom, in the areas of Medicine, Engineering, Law, Accounting, Political Science, Education, Mass Communication, Management, etc., about half of whom have successfully completed their programs.

This year, we will be giving away food packages to support widows and the elderly population in Bonny.

As we are gathered for this occasion, I want to urge you all to relax and have fun with the activities lined up for this convention. These activities will include speeches, our scholarship fund-raising drive, masquerade displays, Awards giving ceremony, and cutting of our anniversary cake. Thanksgiving Service will be held on Sunday, at St. Stephen's Cathedral at 9:30AM., and on Monday, there will be an event "Outreach to Our Community" at the Awanta Guest House, Bonny at 10:00AM.

To conclude, I want to express my profound gratitude to the 2024 Convention Planning Committee Chairman - Dame Joyce Simon-Ogan, Professor Adango Miadonye (Co-Chairman), Chairmen and members of all convention planning sub committees, all members of the Board of Trustees, our Executive team, and BIF general membership for the successful planning, and execution of this convention.

# **Address by Chairman BIF Board of Trustees**

y fellow compatriots, visitors and friends of Grand Bonny, it is with profound gratitude to God Almighty and ultimate humility that I welcome you all to the 21st year anniversary convention of Bonny Island Foundation holding today at the Dolphin Hotel Bonny.

The BIF was formed on the 4th of July 2003 by Bonny indigenes resident in the USA and Canada as the only registered Bonny organization, to be a catalyst for change, to promote education, Ibani culture and heritage, to foster unity and progress among



the Ibani, and to advocate mutual understanding and cooperation between Bonny and all nationalities. The BIF has done an excellent job in keeping to these ideals.

The Bonny Island Foundation (BIF) organized a convention of Bonny organizations on 23rd December 2005 at the Ibanise Town Hall exactly 19 years ago, and we thank God Almighty for enabling us to undertake this second home coming journey the odds notwithstanding. During our last visit to the Island, we noted with dismay and discomfort the poor sanitation on the Island. We note the efforts being made to remedy this unfortunate situation and believe that a lot more still needs to be done, such as the clearing of drainages and construction of adequate storm water canals (drainages) to empty into the sea. The motor bikes on our streets and the attendant hazards they pose to our people is still a sore point. We will humbly appeal to the Local Government council to phase out this mode of transportation and acquire commuter Buses for transportation on the Island. The non-completion of the Bonny ring road and Bonny Bodo Road is worrisome to us and we will like to know why the Bonny ring road has remained a stalled project till date. We complained then of lack of a modern market in Bonny and will like to thank the Local Government council for the modern market we now have in Bonny. We also pointed out the absence of a sea wall or embankment to protect Bonny from coastal erosion. Bonny unfortunately lies below sea level and it is imperative that groynes, a sea wall and boardwalk must be built to preserve our Hometown from being washed away eventually. God forbid. The Rivers State Government should as a matter of urgency be engaged to fund the building of this wall. This wall will not be as costly as the Billion-naira projects being carried out in other communities that do not contribute anything near what Bonny contributes to the State and federal coffers.

It is my belief that on the issue of insecurity on our land, there are a few things we can do to bring about peace and tranquility among our people and discomfiture among our foes. Perhaps one of those will be the establishment within the ambit of the law, of a well-organized and well-funded vigilante system in Bonny Town and adjoining villages.

I pray for God's divine blessings on our King and Grand Patron of BIF King Dr. Edward Asimini Wiliam Dappa Pepple as he celebrates 28 years on the throne of his fathers, on our Deputy







Grand Patron Se Alabo Dr. O R LongJohn for attaining the enviable age of 90years and on our Patron Se Alabo Professor Edward Bristol Alagbariya on becoming the first Bonny Professor of Law.

I on behalf of the Bonny Island Foundation felicitates with Hon Victor Oko Jumbo on his election as the first speaker of the Rivers State House of assembly of Bonny extraction. We note with pride the steps he is taking to support our amiable Governor in ensuring good Governance in the State. We as an organization also rejoice with you, Dame Hon. # BONNY TRADITIONAL SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT

Bonny was founded before 1000 AD. It was structured along the lines of the Greek city states, with a strong central capital and surrounding satellite towns and villages. The King or Amanyanabo is the head of traditional authority in Bonny Kingdom. Next in authority are the district heads or Amadapu and the Chiefs or Se-Alapu. The King has a Chiefs council comprising the Chiefs and district heads, with whom he rules the Kingdom. The Chiefs or Se-Alapu are the heads of the component houses of Bonny.

The administrative units or houses in Bonny are classified into three categories: Duawari which are the aboriginal houses, the Opuwari or major houses derived from the Duawari houses and the Kalawari or minor houses which are branches of the major houses. Their Chiefs are selected or elected based on the tradition of their individual houses.

The Chiefs have a council composed of branch heads called Ikpangi Sibidapu or Wariseniapu, with whom they rule their houses.

The Ikpangi Sibidabo (Head of the family branch) is the head of the family unit within the larger house. A Warisenibo (House elder or representative) represents his House during meetings of the house and before the Chief of the house. The Matriarch of the family unit or Burusu normally appoints her eldest son to be the head of her family unit. The Chief can also a warisenibo as a reward for service to the community. The position of warisenibo is therefore attained by heredity or honorary appointment. The Ogbokoroama, Bonny's club of Mask dancing artists was formed by Queen Kambasa of Bonny. They put on masquerade displays in Bonny for entertainment. They are also part of traditional governance and act as Police in the Kingdom. Ibanise Kubiri or the Peoples parliament is convened during times of emergency, war or when important decisions affecting the Kingdom needs to be taken. The meeting is presided over by a chairman assisted by a secretary. The Ibanise Kubiri is the highest decision-making body in Bonny Kingdom.

## THE BONNY TRADITIONAL MARRIAGE

The Bonny Groom

The Bonny Bride

he Bonny traditional marriage is one of the customs that has withstood the test of time; it is still performed in Bonny today as it was in the Bonny of yore. Naturally, certain aspects of this tradition have changed with the influence of religion and education but one thing remains • unchanged, it is the most acceptable form of marriage in Bonny today.

There are three types of Bonny Traditional Marriage known as the Yaa marriage, the Igwa marriage and Concubinage.

 The Yaa form of the traditional marriage is the most complete and expensive one, because the bride price is usually paid in full and all the marriage rites, performed. The benefits of this marriage form include full rights for the woman in her husband's house and her children will have full inheritance of their father's property.

- The Igwa Marriage, is known as the incomplete marriage because here, the marriage rites have not been completed due to partial payment of the bride price or dowry. Sometimes, this is due to financial difficulties.
- Lastly, The Concubinage form is a different kind of union, more like the common law marriage. The woman engaged in this kind of affair has limited rights in her partner's house. When she dies, she will not be buried







in his home. Suffice it to say that the man and woman will have no in-laws in this kind of arrangement because no marriage rites have been performed.

The Yaa form of the Bonny Traditional Marriage is done in three stages.

In the first stage known as the 'Knocking on the Door', the suitor goes with his father to the parents of the would-be-bride to ask for her hand in marriage. The parents of the girl gives them an appointed time while they verify from their daughter if this is her Mr. Right.

After verifying and researching the potential groom's background, if found suitable, he is invited back to return with his parents. According to the custom, the suitor, his parents and some relatives will return with drinks to present to their potential In-laws.

At the second stage, the Bride Price is named and a list of things to present to the parents of the girl is handed over to the groom and his father.

"The List" varies according to the different families and this normally would include gifts for the parents of the girl. The types of gifts that are normally requested on the List are the bowler hat, Jumper, walking stick and george wrapper for the man. For the woman, it would be a george wrapper

or wrappers, blouse and head tie. After this stage, the Groom and his parents can confidently announce the upcoming marriage to their relatives and friends!

The last stage is the marriage proper, where the Chief and elders of the community are seated on the high table to witness the union in the presence of the parents, relatives, and guests. During the marriage ceremony, the groom and his bride are required to dress up in the appropriate Bonny traditional attires.

Marriage in the Bonny tradition is simple and beautiful, here the In-laws play important roles like negotiating the bride price. While noting that there is no amount of money that can compensate the parents of the bride for raising a daughter, the "Bride Price" is very necessary as it symbolizes her importance in her paternal home and secures her place in her marital home.




### **BIF SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

### -SPEECH BY THE CHAIRPERSON (MRS. IBIE GREEN)

he Bonny Island Foundation set out to accomplish the goal of awarding scholarships to Bonny students as a means to help them stay in college and graduate. The implication of such a decision is to make a positive impact on Bonny society and the country as a whole.

Helping our youths stay in college will help them achieve a higher education and create endless opportunities for them. It



It is in this spirit of community service that the Bonny Island Foundation Scholarship Fund (BIF) was formed. In 2012 when I was the Vice President-At- Large, and Dr. Peter Hart was the president of The BIF, the debate as to how best to celebrate the BIF 10th anniversary came up in one of our general meetings, it occurred to me then that it would be very charitable if the organization could develop a scholarship award scheme to benefit Bonny Students at home. Needless to say, that the idea was well received by Dr. Peter Hart and Dr. Leslie Green (B.O.T Chairman) who encouraged me to form the Scholarship committee. The BIF committee comprises 4 members who have kept the engine of the scholarship fund fully in gear. These gentlemen are Dr. Leslie Green, Advisor Dr. Peter Hart, Treasurer. Engr. Macdonald Bara-Hart, secretary and my humble self, Mrs. Ibie Green, chairperson.

So far, we have started to realize our dream because the first batch of scholarship awards, we gave out was to 30 students, and today that number has increased to a total of 75 awards. Our beneficiaries have written letters of appreciation to say how much their lives have changed with the funds they have received from the BIF Scholarship. Some of them have signed an undertaking committing to support this scholarship scheme when they enter the work force. This gives us much joy, but it will take all hands-on deck to continue this charitable project.

It is an empowering tool that allows us to improve and change our environments. Too many times we depend on the government to do everything for us, but we can resort to self help if we pull our resources together.







This was how the Late Amaopusenibo Spurgeon. A. Green founded the first Bonny Scholarship Board. He was also the first secretary of the scholarship board. The Amaopusenibo pulled off a huge fund-raising effort which gave rise to an educational giant like the Late Amaopusenibo N. A. I Waribere who went on to study at The University of Nigeria, Nsukka. Upon graduation, he headed many institutions. His major accomplishment in Bonny was the outstanding leadership role he displayed as the principal of the Bonny National Grammar School, popularly known as Bonagrams! It was during his tenure that the Bonny National Grammar School Students made the best result in the West African School Certificate Examination in the Rivers State of Nigeria.

Bonny National Old Students who trained under him have continued to advance Bonny intellectually. This gift keeps on giving as is evident in BIF, because most of the BIF members today were Amaopusenibo Waribere's old students.

Giving back to society has a big reward, and it should behoove us all to be charitable, especially when it comes to giving back to your community.

Charity begins at home as the saying goes were it not so Prophet Nehemiah (from the bible) would not have rebuilt the wall of Jerusalem. As the trusted Cup bearer of King ArtaXerxes of Persia, he was comfortable in his newfound country, yet he was not happy that his people, the Jewish people were suffering.

The bible tells us that one day When Nehemiah's brother and other men from the land of Israel paid him a visit, he asked to know about the condition of his country, then they told him about the trouble the Israelites were having, and how the walls of Jerusalem were still broken down. This was not welcome news to Nehemiah, so he prayed to God about it. One day the king noticed that all was not well with Nehemiah and when he asked why he wasn't himself, Nehemiah told him that Jerusalem was in such a bad condition and the walls were broken down. 'What is it that you want?' asked the King. 'Let me go to Jerusalem,' Nehemiah answered, 'so that I may rebuild the walls.' King ArtaXerxes did not only give him permission to go to Jerusalem, he equipped him with some wood to help him with rebuilding the wall.

After the walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt, Nehemiah did a remarkable thing; he documented the names of all who helped to rebuild the wall and inscribed them on the wall for posterity. The lesson to take away from this story is that God wants us to never forget where we come from. Most of us would rather give to some other cause than that which concerns us, and too many times have we heard our brothers and sisters condemn and damn their own hometown at every opportunity they get.

Brothers and Sisters, I implore you to put your money where your mouth is and let's all answer the call of "Do something".

He is being specifically recognized for being the first Bonny Surgeon, and for plying the trade in such a way that made all that came in contact with him, to say that he was arguably the best surgeon amongst his peers. He was Chief Medical Director of University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital Port Harcourt and chairman of Amin Kano University Teaching Hospital. He brought honour and recognition to his homeland Bonny through his profession. Chief Longjohn is a cultural icon and a solid community advocate.



## LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD HISTORY THROUGH ART:

### J.A. GREEN

Jonathan Adagogo Green was the first professional Photographer in Nigeria, born in 1873. His works of art adorn museums and art collections in Nigeria and around the world. The photographs he took in the 1800's are reputed to compare favorably with digital photographs of today. His works have helped to preserve much of the history of pre-colonial and colonial Nigeria. He was a brilliant Ibani star. He continues to bring honour and recognition to Bonny through the art he practiced so well more than a century ago! He was the son of Chief Sunju Dublin Green, who worked closely with foreign traders and missionaries. His works are in major collections in the British Museum, London; Rhodes House, Oxford; Merseyside Maritime Museum, Liverpool; Unilever Archives, Port Sunlight; Manchester University Museum, Whitworth Art Gallery, Manchester and the National Museum of African Art, in Washington D.C USA.









### LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD SERVICE TO GOD AND HUMANITY:

### BISHOP E.T DIMIEARI

Bishop Ebenezer Tamunoteghe Dimicari, a distinguished Bonny Bishop, nationalist, parliamentarian, theologian, philanthropist and ecumenical leader; was born at Georgekiri, Bonny on the 27" of September 1890. On April 27th 1952 he was enthroned as the inaugural Diocesan of the Niger Delta Diocese. He was the first indigenous Bishop of the Niger Delta, the first Nigerian to be appointed CBE by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II of England in 1956. He later went on to electrify the Diocesan Cathedral at a personal cost to him. He adopted well over 85 children from around the country and called them his rainbow. He labored for the benefits of the oppressed and will always be considered our most reverent Bishop.

### AMAOPUSENIBO N.A.L WARIBERE

Born 5/16/1924 a Arugbanama, Bonny. Educated at Bonny Government school, Bonny, St. Mark's College, Awka and University of Nigeria, Nsukka. His academic Brilliance made the First Bonny Scholarship Board and SPDC to sponsor his education at the University level. Waribere a true Bonny patriot, put his soul, mind and body into his work as Principal of Bonny National Grammar School. At BNGS his first batch of students in the WASC exam had a passing score of 98.4%, the best in the state! He is with good reason regarded as the best Principal of BNGS. His former students at BNGS constitute the largest group of Bonny youth doing well today in different walks of life in and outside the shores of Nigeria.

### CHIEF R.T. E. DAPPA WILCOX

Chief R.T.E. Dappa Wilcox was born in 1901 at Peterside, Bonny. He was the father of Chief Dappaa Birive. Some of his notable achievements were: Spearheading the formation of the Ijaw people's league in 1943 at Enitonna High School in Port Harcourt. He was elected as the first President General of the Ijaw People's League. He rightly is the father of Ijaw nationalism and Consciousness. He Studied law in the United Kingdom and graduated with an LLB in June 1948, and became the first lawyer of Ijaw ethnic Stock. In 1952 he was made the first Chancellor of the Niger Delta Diocese. He is the first Nigerian to be awarded the MVO by the Queen of England. He was the first Chief Magistrate of jaw Origin. He later passed to the bosom of the Lord on May 8th 1964.

### AMA OPUSENIBO SIR PROFESSOR EDWARD OPUADA IWO NTE BANIGO.



Bennett Airmail College, London, 1940-1942) Associate Chartered Institute of Secretaries ACIS. Joined the Royal West African Frontier Force as an Orderly (1942-1944). Employed by the United African Company (UAC) of Nigeria, Port Harcourt-1970. Rose to the rank of Area Manager, Western Region of Nigeria before retiring in 1970.

Appointed Area Manager, Nigeria Cold Stores, Port Harcourt, 1970-1985. Now a Contractor with Shell Petroleum Development Company of Nigeria (SPDC Bonny 1985 till date. For many years the leader of Bonny communities in Port Harcourt, Lagos, Kano, Jos etc where he served as President of the BIA. During the Civil war, he prevailed on the Federal Government to allow food to be shipped to Bonny to avert starvation in the land. He was for many months made to personally unpack and repack every parcel in front of federal troops to prove that such parcels did not contain arms before shipment to Bonny. He started the erection of the first concrete steps and shelter for travelers at the Bonny waterside jetty in PortHarcourt. He and twenty nine others formed the first Bonny Scholarship Board. He was the first Chairman of the Bonny Employment Bureau, and Chairman of many conflict resolution committees in Bonny. He is a community advocate per excellence. He is chairman of the Bonny Historical Society and lead author of the most comprehensive book on the history of Bonny to date. In carriage, dress, speech and manners, he represents the quintessential Ibani man. He is a foremost Bonny patriot.

### AMAPUSENIBO ADADONYE FOMBO


### PROF. HOWELLS J. HART








## REMEMBERING A PIONEER AND LEGEND JONATHAN ADAGOGO GREEN (1873 – 1905) FIRST NIGERIAN PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER.

r. Jonathan Adagogo Green was born in the village of Ayama (Peterside) in the year 1873 to Chief Sunju Dublin Green and Madam Idamienye Dublin Green. He had two siblings his elder brother Chief Christopher Biebelemabo Dublin Green, who was Chief of Dublin Green house at Ayama from 1895 to 1899 and his sister Ms. Ayanne Dublin Green. Jonathan's father died while he was still a toddler, necessitating his uncle Chief Oruasi Dublin Green who was Chief of Dublin Green house from 1875 to 1895, to take over his care and training from a tender age. Jonathan could be said to have had aristocratic beginnings as his father and uncle who raised him were prominent figures in one of Bonny's four founding houses.



Jonathan's wealthy and influential uncle allowed his nephew to apprentice with G.F. Packer, a British missionary sent to Bonny to design and build the CMS

school Jonathan later attended. An accomplished photographer, Packer is credited with training J. A. Green in the workings of the camera—still a novel device at the time—and the tedious process of making albumen prints. He is said to have also had additional training in photography in Sierra Leone under the tutelage of an older African Photographer before returning to Bonny to set up his studio in 1891. His studio was set up close to the King's quarter, an area reserved at the time for the most esteemed in the society.

Jonathan Adagogo Green was Nigeria's first Master Artist Photographer and Historian. J.A. Green's works preserve a vanishing past. His hands on the shutter button of his camera, a new technology at the time, ensured that the old ways did not vanish. He had a calling, which was to properly document the political, commercial/industrial, and social life that surrounded him. He was a sensitive human being who used his medium and profession to the highest levels and responsibly observed and documented his environment, the people, and their activities for posterity. He found himself straddling two worlds: one as an Ibani young man born into an elite trading family, and the other as the British colony of Nigeria's chief photographer. His photographic work, mostly around the Niger Delta and Southern Nigeria offers a unique window into late nineteenth-century West Africa, capturing the intricate interplay between traditional customs and colonial influences. He used photography as a medium for cultural expression and historical documentation.

The region where he resided was incorporated into the British Oil Rivers protectorate in 1884, later renamed the Niger Coast Protectorate in 1893, and eventually became part of the Southern Nigeria Protectorate from 1900 until the end of J A Green's life.


His work is so seminal that no history of African photography can be discussed without mentioning his name and his works. The iconic pictures and scenes that he recorded provide us with a unique and maybe only insight into what precolonial and colonial Nigeria looked like. Nigeria and indeed all patriots owe Jonathan Adagogo Green a debt of gratitude for recording and preserving our history through Photography. Jonathan Adagogo Green practiced his art for only 14years in and around southern Nigeria. He died in 1905 and left behind an enduring legacy of Pictorial history. The pioneering role of Jonathan Adagogo Green's photographic artistry was painstakingly resurrected and documented in the book 'African photographer J A Green' edited by Martha G Anderson and Lisa Aronson with guidance from Prof. E J Alagoa and was published by Indiana University press in 2017. A few of the iconic pictures he took are:













Before the year 2013, majority of Nigerians in Diaspora did not pay much attention to the life and times of Jonathan Adagogo Green. The BIF in 2013 gave a posthumous lifetime achievement award to J A Green during its 10th anniversary celebration in Atlanta Georgia. This award was in recognition of the monumental work he did more than a hundred years ago to promote Bonny, the ljaw nation and indeed our country Nigeria.

In preparing the citation on J A Green I relied heavily on information made available to me by late Amaopusenibo Spurgeon Adawari Green who was Chairman of Bonny Historical Society at the time. After the presentation ceremony Warisenibo Atedo Denton Banigo mentioned that he was hearing of Jonathan Green for the first time and suggested that the BIF should rebuild JAG's monument, which was visibly in need of repairs. The idea of rebuilding the monument was accepted by all members of BIF as worthwhile and a decade of fund raising for the project followed thereafter. Warisenibo Atedo Denton Banigo not only suggested we rebuild the monument; he was tenacious and dogged in raising funds for this project. After raising funds for the project, the BIF was lucky to have Warisenibo/Amaopusenibo Sotonye Banigo on ground to direct and supervise the work. He was assisted by Amaopusenibo Dennis Ezekiel Hart.

## IRIA CEREMONY AND EREMINOGBO IN GRAND BONNY KINGDOM



IRIAPU SHOWCASING DIFFERENT BONNY TRADITIONAL WRAPPERS

he people of Grand Bonny Kingdom in the Rivers State of Nigeria are called Ibani. They are known to be gentle and graceful, and this extends well into their rich cultural heritage. The geographical location of the town connects it to the Atlantic Ocean, a great advantage that put her at the crossroads of the Atlantic trade in the 15th century. Needless to say, Bonny saw a lot of sea merchants who brought in gold, silver and other colorful merchandize to her shores. The influence of western civilization has its imprint all over the fabric of the Ibani culture, and this is evident in their traditional garbs and way of life in general.

Howbeit, the advent of Christianity and education did not take away the traditional way of life from the Ibani people, rather it enhanced it. Such traditions as marriage and the Iria ceremony have all withstood the test of time.

In Ibani culture, the iria ceremony is the rite of passage from girlhood to womanhood. It is a colorful ceremony that involves the tying of different beautiful wrappers, donning expensive jewelry, and dancing in the town square. To witness the ceremony are the chief, elders and other members of the community.

The Iria ceremony is a requirement for all women in Bonny, including those that marry into the culture. It is considered a taboo for a Bonny woman to die without performing her iria. When the former is the case, tradition demands that the ceremony be carried out on the death bed before the body could be buried. Over the years, the iria ceremony has become more popular, one reason could be because it is a "show off" culture! There is so much that goes into planning, and carrying out the ceremony that it takes years for most women to save up for it.

There are certain privileges that come with performing the Iria ceremony, such as: gaining acceptance into certain women's clubs and the right to tie the Erebu and Mbudu in the Bonny township. The Erebu and Mbudu are Ibani words which stand for the bottom and top wrappers. The Erebu is the first piece of wrapper tied from the waist to the ankle, and the mbudu is usually tied on top of the Erebu, from the waist to just below the knee. This traditional outfit is for women who have completed the Iria Ceremony.

In the Grand Bonny Kingdom of old, when a young teenage girl reached the age of puberty, her mother prepared her for the Iria ceremony. it was the responsibility of her parents to buy, acquire or borrow the necessary materials which she would need for the celebration. If the girl was







already engaged to be married, then the responsibility was shared between the fiancé and her parents.

THE FATTENING ROOM: In the past, the pubescent girl was confined to a room called the fattening room, where she did nothing other than eat and sleep, and she was not even allowed to take a walk outside of the house. In the fattening room, she would be attended to by women who have gone through the iria ceremony. While the woman is going through this stage, she is referred to as the Iriabo. The period of confinement in those days could be up to six months. Today, the fattening period for the modern day Iriabo is about one week. The belief is that the Iriabo looks well and radiant when her body is full.

During her confinement in the fattening room, the Iriabo is dressed with a hand-woven cloth called the Suu, which drapes her from her chest to the knees. She receives beauty treatments, and massages with special oils and emollients such as the cam wood, palm oil, and



Shea butter leaving her skin shiny and radiant. At the end, her skin is tattooed with ink which washes away with time.

During the last week of the fattening room stage, a group of women traditional dancers known as the Ereminogbo, will come to the house to do a dance rehearsal with the Iriabo. This exercise is known as the buodi. If she already knows how to do the traditional dance moves, then their job becomes easy, otherwise they would go through a period of dance lessons with her.

#### STAGES IN THE IRIA CEREMONY AND NAMES OF THE WRAPPERS

The tying of cloth is done in stages: The first stage is known as the tying of the Kala-egerebite. In the olden days, this stage was done when the young woman reached between the age of 10 and 15. The second stage called the Opu-egerebite was done between the age of 18 and 21, and the third and last stage called the Bighibite was done from the age of 40. The age limit has changed today, when the woman is of age these 3 stages can be done in one or 2 days.

The Iria ceremony is divided into the morning and afternoon sessions. In the morning, the Ereminogbo who have performed this rites, and are experienced in dressing the Iriabo, will meet to dress her up in her parent's house. The wrapper tying in itself is an art form: Usually, two women from the group will do the dressing whilst the others watch and make merry. Two hand woven wrappers are tied on the waist of the Iriabo to make them look full, before tying the colorful ikaki wrapper on top to look like a long maxi skirt. After the first rounds of dance, the Iriabo undergoes a wardrobe change into another colorful hand woven wrapper called the popo. In the evening, her Ereminogbo attendees will dress her up with the beautiful damask, followed by the Awomiebite. The last wrapper change will be the george.

The Awomiebite is a plain george, hand dyed in cam wood. It is the most important wrapper amongst the ensemble, because when a Bonny woman dies, it is the first wrapper that is tied on her







body underneath any other clothing she wears to the grave. Due to this reason, this wrapper cannot be borrowed.

To finish the look, a beautiful lace blouse will be fitted over her top wrapper at each change. Chunky coral beads adorn the woman's neck, with matching earrings, bracelets, and gold rings on the fingers. The gold jewelry would be pure weighty gold. On the top of her hair, she wears a crown made with coral. While dancing bare footed, she holds flowers decorated with little jingle bells on both hands to add to the music.

The Kala-egerebite: Kala means small in the Ibani language. During this stage the Suu wrapper is tied in a mini form, from the waist to the knees of the Iriabo by her attendant Women. Suu is a hand woven cloth.



The Opu-egerebite: Opu means big and as you can guess, this means that the wrappers worn at this stage are big. They are also hand woven and colorful. Examples of this type of wrappers are the Ikaki and Popo. The Ikaki wrapper has triangular designs on it, whilst the Popo wrapper has square designs.

The Bighibite: This is the George tying stage and the last stage of the ceremony. The george wrapper named appropriately, is said to have been introduced into the Bonny culture from India by King George Pepple of Bonny in the 19th century. In the past, this stage was done when



the Bonny woman had attained the age of 40 and above. Today it can be done on the same day or the next day after the Kala-egerebite and Opu-egerebite stages. Without the Bighibite ceremony, the Bonny woman is prohibited from tying the up and down (erebu and mbudu) george wrappers in the Bonny Kingdom.

On the day of the celebration, the Iriabo is expected to dance around the town square led by two good Ereminogbo dancers, one in front and another behind. In the middle of the square, a table is prepared for the elder statesmen, where they would sit, chat, and drink during the celebration. A young girl dances besides the Iriabo holding a saucer for collecting gifts from guests who generously and lavishly "spray" her with money. Other gift items include traditional Bonny wrappers. For her part, the Iriabo throws candies and little packets of cookies to the children in the crowd.

When the dance has gotten to a frenzy, the parents of the celebrant present her with gifts as they dance along with her. If she is married, her husband will do the same. This usually kicks off the gift-giving session as friends and relatives follow suit.





At the ceremony, guests are entertained to an all day feast of traditional dishes, fine wines, and spirits. This ceremonial dance usually takes place on a Saturday in the dance square. It will be worthy to mention that the friends and relatives render support to the Iriabo and her family. Such help as cooking, serving, decorating, and running of errands are very much appreciated by the Iriabo family. In most families, a heirloom of gold and coral beaded jewelry are kept in preparation for such a time when a daughter from the family might need to borrow them for their iria ceremony. This is a very good idea because these preparations (as aforementioned) can be very expensive.

The dance square is usually decorated with banners and buntings by men folks in the village, they also build a small gazebo-like house with the colorful ikaki wrappers in the corner of the square. A chair and foot stool are provided for the Iriabo to rest on, in- between dances. The chair and stool are also covered with the ikaki cloth.

The Ereminogbo group and some male drummers provide music for the dance. The Ereminoogbo clap their hands and sing familiar dance songs, while the male folks punctuate the songs with their deep baritone in agreement with its message. At each wardrobe change, the Iriabo would display at the arena.

At the end of the celebration, the iriabo is carried off to her parent's or husband's house on top of the shoulders of able bodied men. The next day, which is on a Sunday, the iriabo can rightfully tie the Eregbu and Mbudu in form of, either the Popo cloth or the ikaki, and this time she ties a head tie with her outfit. Accompanied by friends and relatives, she goes to church to give thanks to God.

After the Thanksgiving Service, the Iriabo walks around the town with relatives greeting friends and neighbors. The iria ceremony is usually characterized by pomp and elegance. It is said that in those days, on such occasions, many suitors found their brides.



## MASQUERADES IN BONNY CULTURE



n the traditional religion of the Ibanis, veneration of ancestors was observed while water spirits known as ownamapu were honored and celebrated. They also believed that water spirits had special strengths and shortcomings like human beings. Humans were believed to live among the water spirits before birth. The Ibanis held celebrations to honor the water spirits and masquerades featured prominently in these celebrations. These masquerades were elaborate outfits with carved masks as headgear. The head gear were often replicas of particular water spirits or animals. The masquerades dance to beat of drums and mimic the steps and mannerisms of animals or water spirits. With the coming of Western civilization, Ibanis changed from traditional worship to Christianity. Masquerades are now played in Bonny mainly for historical and entertainment purposes.

### IBANI MEN TRADITIONAL DRESS


ur style of dressing was influenced a great deal by our interaction with European traders and Missionaries who traded and mingled with the Kings, Chiefs and people of Bonny before the creation of the entity known as Nigeria. Being the first within our region to make contact with the outside world, it became inevitable, that Christianity, education and our mode of dressing would spread to our neighbors in due course. The different styles of dresses in and around the south south and south east of Nigeria are all modifications of the Ibani style of dressing. The Ibani cap is acknowledged by all to have been worn and introduced by Bonny People to the Nigerian fashion scene. The cap is an adaptation of the smoking cap or lounge cap worn in Victorian England to keep the hair from smelling of tobacco after smoking. It was also worn in winter and by sailors for warmth. The design of the 'two for a bob shirt' worn in 15th century England by commoners and workers was adopted and renamed Etibo by the Ibanis. The Feni material became popular in Bonny after English sailors who used them as warm clothing during their voyages, gave them out as gifts or 'dash" while trading at Bonny. The George wrapper now widely used all over Southern Nigeria is named after King George Oruigbiji Pepple of Bonny. King George Oruigbiji Pepple introduced the George wrapper to Bonny in 1870 after his return from England.

#### **ETIBO**

TIBO is generally worn by young men and adults in the community as informal wear. The two-for-a- bob shirt which later became known as a two-bob shirt and was eventually named the Etibo shirt by the Ibani People. The Etibo is an elongated free flowing shirt, extending to the knee and usually made of white cotton material. It has a short rounded hard collar with a single stud at the neck and is worn over a trouser or wrapper. It is never tucked in. It can have a long or short sleeve. Socks are not worn with shoes when wearing the Etibo.








#### **REGATTA SHIRT**

The Regatta shirt is worn by young men and adults as a semiofficial dress and is also worn on festive occasions. It is similar to the etibo but has a pleated or other design on the breastplate area of the chest, with a three-stud button hole and is often a long-sleeved shirt. It is worn with a matching fedora hat, boater straw hat, bowler hat or Ibani cap.

#### HALF DON

Half Don is worn by adults, men of substance, titled citizens, Chiefs and the King. The Half Don is pretty much like the Don with the only difference being in their respective lengths. The Don extends below the ankle while the Half Don does not extend to the ankle.







#### JUMPER

This is the formal or official dress of the Ibani man. It is worn by adults, men of substance, titled citizens, Chiefs and the King. It is usually made of more expensive material and extends to the knee. It is worn over wrapper or matching trousers, walking stick, bowler hat, fedora or Ibani cap. The front of the garment is designed with a ladder or fish grill design. It accommodates three stud button holes with an attached chain-link.







#### DON

The Don is worn by men from the age of 50 years and above, heads of households, men of substance, Chiefs and the King. The Don extends from the shoulders to the space between the feet and the ankles. It is made of silk or other expensive material. It has a short front collar, a pleated or other design on the breast plate area extending to the lower abdomen and four stud button holes connected by a gold or silver chain. A white shirt with a short round hard collar with a single stud button hole is worn under the Don. The Don has long sleeves which are folded back at the wrist to expose the bright cotton or lace shirt worn underneath the Don. The Don can be worn over wrapper or matching trousers with an Ibani cap, Bowler hat, Boater straw hat or Top hat.










## ST. STEPHENS CATHEDRAL CHURCH BONNY



he Ibani people are Christians. Majority of the inhabitants of the area converted to Christianity in the early1800's. King William Dappa People of Bonny elected to become a Christian while in England, so that God will grant him power and wisdom to rule his people. King William Dappa People of Bonny was baptized by Reverend G H McGill and later confirmed by Bishop Tait, the Bishop of London. At the behest of King William Dappa People the Church Missionary Society in London sent Bishop Samuel Ajayi Crowther, the first black African Bishop to Bonny in 1864 to establish the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ in Bonny.

From Bonny Christianity spread to the neighboring communities of Twon and Nembe in 1868, Kalabari and Okrika in 1878, and thereafter to Andoni, Ogoni, Ikwerre and the hinterlands of Eastern Nigeria. On 24th January 1889, Bonny Christians presented their beautiful church to Bishop Samuel Ajayi Crowther as his Cathedral. Students of St. Stephen's Day School also presented a throne(seat) to his Lord for use in the Church. He accepted the throne and St. Stephens Church as his Cathedral. The Church was eventually dedicated by the Bishop on 27th February ,1889. St. Stephens Cathedral thus became the first Anglican Cathedral Church in Nigeria and the second Cathedral Church in West Africa.







On April 27th 1952 The Rt. Rev. E.T. Dimieari was enthroned as the inaugural Diocesan of the Niger Delta Diocese. He was the first indigenous Bishop of the Niger Delta.

The Cathedral was eventually dedicated by the bishop on 27th February, 1889





Do you know that the first Anglican graduate Priest east of the Niger, was Rev. Canon T.T Green? In 1958 he was selected to study at St. John's College Dunelm, UK. He graduated with a B.A. Honors (ancient history, philosophy and religious studies). This illustrious son of Bonny thus emerged as the first graduate pastor in the Niger Delta Diocese.











Chief R.T.E. Dappa Wilcox was born in 1901 at Peterside, Bonny. He was the father of Chief Dappa Biriye. Some of his notable achievements were: Spearheading the formation of the Ijaw people's league in 1943 at Enitonna High School in Port Harcourt. He was elected as the first President General of the Ijaw People's League. He rightly is the father of Ijaw nationalism and Consciousness. He Studied law in the United Kingdom and graduated with an LLB in June 1948, and became the first lawyer of Ijaw ethnic Stock. In 1952 he was made the first Chancellor of the Niger Delta Diocese. He is the first Nigerian to be awarded the Member of Victorian Order (MVO) by the Queen of England. He was the first Chief Magistrate of Ijaw Origin. He later passed to the bosom of the lord On May 8th 1964.

The first Court of equity in Nigeria was Setup in 1854, In Bonny and the first indigenous Chairman of the Court was Chief Adda Allison who took Over from Capt. R.D. Boler.





Do you know that the first graduate east of the Niger was a Bonny man? Ijaw people had their pioneer University Graduate in 1856; he was Herbert Jumbo who obtained his degree from the University of London in 1856. Chief Herbert Jumbo was instrumental in the establishment of the Church in Burukiri.










Chief John Jumbo of Bonny was the second Ijaw University Graduate. He graduated from the University of Durham in 1878.

He was the Chief of staff of the Nigerian Air force from 1966 to 1967and was later appointed Nigeria's Ambassador to the then Soviet Union, Before retirement, he attained the rank of Brigadier General. General George Kurubo died in the year 2000.




In 1897 a British Consulate was established in Bonny. It was manned by a District Commissioner, an Assistant, Police Officers, and Officers of the Medical, Marine, Works, and Education Departments. Today a new Bonny Consulate has been built in 2022.









Do you know that the first professional photographer in Nigeria was born in Bonny, in 1873? He was Jonathan Adagogo Green the son of Chief Sunju Dublin Green, who worked closely with foreign traders and missionaries. His works are in major collections in the British Museum, London; Rhodes House, Oxford; Merseyside Maritime Museum, Liverpool; Unilever Archives, Port Sunlight; Manchester University Museum, Whitworth Art Gallery, Manchester and the National Museum of African Art, in Washington D.C USA.

Queen Kambasa of Bonny was a Nigerian ruler who was the first queen of Bonny and considered the first queen from the Niger Delta. Kambasa was a successor of King Edimini, her father, while her grandfather, King Asimini, was a famous Amanyanabo or ruler in Bonny. Asimini introduced the trade with Europeans in Bonny and created Bonny's first royal line. Prior to Asimini, kingship in Bonny was given to the oldest man, a priest or very important person. She was crowned king when she seized the symbol of kingship, the "Ivory Tusk" and was able to make the king makers crown her. Demonstrating her knowledge of survival politics, she

surrounded herself with loyal palace guards. As queen, she created a military unit and served as an arts patron. She is also associated with the cult of the war god, Ikuba.



Ogugumanga High School was established at Bonny in 1890 and was headed by Rev Hugh Stowell Macaulay. That was the first Secondary School in the Eastern part of Nigeria. The school was discontinued after about ten years and the Bonny Government School was established in its place in 1904.

Ogugumanga High School was later to be transferred to become Government College, Umuahia. Before 1909, only two government secondary schools existed in the southern provinces, and these were the Hope Waddell Institute in Calabar and the Ogugumanga Industrial Institute, Bonny.
